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## EDITOR'S THOUGHTS ON HER FIRST SDA KINSHIP BOARD MEETING

As the sun rose on a warm January morning in West Hollywood, my Eastern-Standard-Time body was already wide awake, waiting for the Pacific Coast to catch up.

This would be my first Kinship Board Meeting. My mod wasn't closed, I pretty much expect the best of most situations, but having served on many boards in my 57 years of life, I know that it is quite possible for a Board Meeting to become a Board Meeting.

I also know that when you have a group of people from all walks of life whose commonality are two such "controversial" areas of life as religion and sexuality, the Board Meeting might not be a boring one, but would certainly have the potential to be a disagreeable one.

People arrived, took off their shoes after entering the home where shoes are left in the narthex. (Do homes have narthexes? And what IS the plural of narthex?) Before 9:00 a.m. the meeting had begun ... people sitting in chairs, on the couch, and on the floor. (See the photo on page 5.)

Twelve hours later, with a only mid-day break for lunch, the meeting was over and supper began.

So how did it go? I was amizzed. I was pleased. I was proud.

And I got all but about an inch of a sock knitted for my sister. (I told everyone at the beginning of the day that if my clicking needles bothered them they could let me know and I'd kindly stop knitting. I also told them that I talk less when I knit. Nobody asked me to stop knitting.)

The decisions were reached with compassion, intelligence, sensitivity, sensibility, and even humor. Being humans, there were plenty of disagreements, but they were handled as discussions. Nobody stomped his or her stocking fact or walked out. I wouldn't have expected it, but I truly expected more disagreements than I heard.

When I was attending La Sierra on my path to a Physical Therapy degree at Loma Linda University, 1 was in a continual financial struggle. SDA Kinship has been very blessed over the years with what many members consider to be an appropriate place to tithe. bridge can be built between gay Adventists and the institutional SDA church. The answer is this: After 25 years, I'm still not sure.

There have definitely been signs of change in the institutional church -- as well as among guy Adventists. Signs of the Times, Insight, Ministry. Adventist Today, and Adventist Review have oublished extensive articles on the topic of "homosexuality" in the past two years. Gay Adventists are far more open and candid in their identities and actions. As more and more gay SDA's "come out," it has become increasingly clear that this is an issue that effects many if not all Adventist families. A recent survey of Adventist academy students revealed that 5% of sexually active hoys and 5% of sexually active girls have had same-gender sexual experiences and relationships. All sides of the debate can agree on one thing -- it is a real challenge facing the Adventist church.

Yet, awareness and openness have not necessarily translated to acceptance and affirmation. The 1999 SDA church policy on homosexuality is one of the most cruel issued by the church. And many of the SDA layperson-associated "outreach groups" to gays have links to so-called transformational programs like Exodus. As a friend said recently, "Adventists will now call me gay instead of

faggot -- but they still hate everything about me."

Twenty-five years ago when Kinship started, the enemy was ignorance. The enemy is still ignorance. And we have new challenges in building bridges to the institutional church. Many say that this effort is doomed to failure. Perhaps so. But if gay Adventists are not willing to build a bridge to their church, who will? Furthermore, even if the institutional church never changes, there are individual Adventist members who are openminded and ready to learn. If gay Adventists are to build bridges within Adventism, we must bring enlightenment to ignorance.

The keys to bridge-building are threefold. First, individually and collectively, gay Adventists must remain healthy and whole. We cannot minister to ourselves or others unless we are well first. This means that we must work toward a life that is honest, genuine, integrated, spiritual, authentic, sober, educated and filled with goodwill. The greatest witness we provide others is the example of our lives shared with fellow Adventists – gay or straight.

Second, we must identify our Adventist allies in the formation of gay-straight alliances. Too often, our straight allies within the Adventist church have gone unsupported. When was the last time you made it your business to contact a former Kinship Kampmeeting speaker just to ask about them? When was the last time you made it a point to contact a gay supportive Adventist parent to say "thank you?" Without this type of investment in our friends, gay Adventists will never effect change in the Adventist church. We must make it our priority to nurture our allies and friends within Adventism - they are there!

Third, we must be very clear in defining what we stand for and natrolling ethical boundaries. While Jesus may arrive in glory tomorrow. we must always be working toward a better world each day. This not only means standing up for gay people and gay relationships, but it also means fighting against violence, sexism, anti-Semitism, genderism, ethnocentrism, ageism and racism. It also means fighting against so-called transformational programs, slander, and the deliberately confusing language of hatred. It will not be enough to simply be neutral to the cause of human beings or human rights. Definitions and boundary protections will require a velvet glove of love and an iron grip of tneaning.

That I can write openly is a testament to the work of Kinship. Gay Adventists have a proud legacy to stand on. But our work and energies must continually be assessed and reinvented. I believe that bridges to the SDA institutional church are possible. We must build on the courage, energy, and hope of those that have brought us here. And we must continue to pray to a Creator that loves us for ALL that we are, \(\mathbb{V}\)

What is your principal hobby? Communicating with friends and family members via e-mail and telephone; also coin collecting.


What do you consider to be the most unusual event in your life?

## DEAR EDITOR....

Dear Editor,

I don't know how I would have survived my sophomore year in college if I hadn't been receiving the Connection. Allow me to relate my story. It happened in March 1994. I had never felt so happy in my life. It was the first time I felt close to a person. Ever since I was in elementary school. I had always dreamed of having a guy best friend whom I could tell everything and with whom I could do everything. Now I had that close friend who cared so much about me. I was also happy because I was finally where I belonged -- a music conservatory. I didn't care if I was the only SDA or the only Filipino.

Then it happened. One night my best friend was giving me a massage. We started exploring each other and we fooled around. It was the most exciting and rewarding feeling I've ever had. He spent the night and slept with his head on my chest.

The following day, I felt uneasy. All I could think of was what had happened the night before. I couldn't concentrate in class and felt like I had a fever. That night my best friend called me on the phone. He wanted to talk to me in person, so I went to his room. He said he wanted to talk to me about what happened. Then he asked me "Are you gay?" I couldn't answer. I thought what we were doing was normal. It was just a guy thing. Guys just love to have fun, you know. He came out to me and then he said, "I think you're gay."

Unfortunately, our six-month love affair turned out to be a nightmare for me. My best friend was just using me. I, on the other hand, fell madly in love with him. I remember coming home to Riverside, and not being able to sleep every night. His voice kept on ringing in my heart: "Are you gay?" I recall secretly looking for answers at the La Sierra University Library. The first answer I found was from the American Psychological Journal stating that homosexuality is not a mental disorder. I couldn't stand it any longer. I couldn't tell anybody. so I decided to go back to Florida and spend the summer alone, away from family. I did spend the whole summer reading all the gay books from the public library, checking out all the bookstores in the mall. But I still felt dirty. I am a Seventh-day Adventist. I can't be a sinner. I am a Filipino. To be gay is a Caucasian American thing. I am Asian. The more I prayed the more I learned to come to terms with myself.

Then one day I bought GENRE magazine. As I was flipping through the ads, I came across one that said: SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS, YOU ARE NOT ALONE. Wow, there was an organization affirming SDA Gays. After finally leaving my name and address, (it was an answering machine and I felt uncomfortable leaving my information), I received a packet which included the Connection within a week.

I was so excited. Wow, there's an "out" student from Andrews University (Scott Wiemers). There was an ad: Do you hear what I hear? Join KinNet. There was a Kampmeeting group photo. They even had an 800 number and a

regional coordinator from Florida! I called the regional coordinator right away. I was so impressed. He was a choir director and a youth ministry leader in church. His region even had a booth in a gay event. It was sad though because the regional coordinator was moving to another state in a few months. The next 2 years of my undergrad years would be spent communing with the Connection. Our region didn't have any activity after Jay Lopez (pseudonym) left. I had wanted to become a regional coordinator back then but circumstances prevented that at the time.

I remember waiting for each Connection. At last I was not alone! The population of our conservatory was 40 and there were 3 gays (my best friend, his boyfriend and myself). I knew when I started my graduate studies in New York or visited my relatives in California. I would be able to interact with the writers from the Connection in person. I wondered if I had overlooked any issues in the magazine stacks at La Sierra University. I wondered how people in the "third world countries" like Asia and Africa reacted to gay SDA's. This can't be just an American thing. (A few years later, I was able to correspend with students from South Africa, Nigeria, China, Dominican Republic, Brazil, Chile, Australia, etc.) I dreamed of attending Kampmeeting, Someday when I could afford a plane ticket I'd be able to attend, and after five years of reading about it, I did get to attend!

When I look back at my years in college, sometimes I feel so negative because I was at the wrong place at the wrong time. But then I would think of my excitement every time another copy of Kinship's newsletter would arrive.

I remember Michael McLaughlin at Kampmeeting crying as he read Larry Hallock's ad in the newspaper: GAY SDA, AM I THE ONLY ONE? Yes, I was the only SDA in my school but as I received each copy of the Connection, I was assured that I was not alone.

I finally came out to my parents at the age of 25! But being in the Asian culture made things worse. Needing support never stops, ch? Well, the Connection will never stop giving me moral support. After connecting with gay SDA's we probably each have found some sensitive issues where more support is needed. Hey, I do need support from other youth, parents, family members, and friends, and most especially I need the support of ASIANS! I won't complain to the Editor that these needs are not being met because no 'newsletter' can do it all. That's why we each need to 'be here' -- to give moral support to each other when we need it. Please know you can count on me. \*

When seven-year-old Jeff suggested that he would show me his if I showed him mine in our hideout under the baseball bleachers near our Adventist grade school, my six-year-old mind was filled with interest. I immediately unzipped my jeans.

However, although my curiosity was satisfied 20 minutes later, the game awakened in me feelings that I could not identify.

Seven years later when I was a missionary kid at Far Hastern Academy in Singapore I finally learned that people aroused by the same sex were faggots, queers, outcasts. I never associated those labels with myself until I transferred to Gem State Academy in Idaho after my parents divorced and the youth there decided that I was one of those wackos.

Two years later, it was an introverted, sexually frustrated 17-yearold who graduated and moved to Walla Walla College. I hoped that people would not make fun of me there and was relieved that I would no longer have to regularly check

bathroom stall walls to scrub off scrawled jeers and obscene drawings mocking the man I was growing up to be.

I soon found that although the students were not as harsh, I had to jump the hurdle of being able to admit that I was a faggot, a queer, a gay before I could set my mind on studies.

That is where Kinship came in.
Shortly after my 18th birthday a
friend introduced me to Dong
Taylor, who was Kinship's hot-line
coordinator, and he in turn introduced me to Kinship. The support
of other Adventist gays was what I
needed most of all, and I spent
hours talking to regional members
and thumbing through old
Connections.

A couple of years later Kinship President Darin Olsen noticed my interest in journalism and nominated me to take the helm of the Connection. That responsibility was without a doubt the stepping stone I needed to come to grips with who I am. The editorship allowed me to flex my young journalistic muscles white exploring my sexuality.

A couple more years passed and I found that I had accepted that I was gay. But I also realized that another issue had cropped up. Even though I had made several attempts to have sexually satisfying relationships, I was too shy, too awkward and -- let's face it -- too ashamed to loosen up enough to enjoy sex. I wondered whether it would be hetter to live without sex. The thought of marrying and raising Adventist kids crossed my mind, but only briefly because I had heard tragic stories from Kinship members who regretted having strayed from their homosexual feelings. I also dehated whether I wanted to work for the church. careers that that my parents and their parents had followed.

It was 1995. I had lived in the United States for seven of my 22. years and I wanted out. Kinship comforted me and my handful of friends supported me, but I did not feel at home. I felt that I could not find my sexuality in surroundings where I had felt repressed by Adventists from the moment I arrived.

An opportunity to intern in Russia gave me just the opportunity I sought and I leaped for it. I figured that the 10-month contract at an Adventist English school would let confront my feelings about working for the Adventist church and about sex.

Upon my arrival in the former Soviet Union I soon saw that the officials mining the school did not have my vision of God in their hearts. They repeatedly lied to the new teachers and played shady financial games with the Russian authorities and the students. I was disappointed.

Within a month I had had sex several times with one of the other teachers (who insisted he only had gay urges when he was drunk) and befriended my first gay Russian. More Russian friendships followed and by the end of my stay in Russia I discovered that sex could not just be satisfying but great. But I still was not fully comfortable with sex.

Meanwhile, I realized that I wanted to develop the skills I had picked up as the editor of the Connection by following a career in journalism.

When I graduated from college six months later, I flew straight back to Russia and was hired shortly afterward by a newspaper. In the past three years I have moved from copy editor to chief copy editor to deputy night editor to deputy business editor. My New Year's wish was granted a few weeks early last December when I was appointed a full-time reporter.

Also over the three years I formed more friendships and continued to fight my inhibitions about sex. During a recent evening I leafed through a few issues of the Connection that I had put out, and I was surprised at how primitive my editing, layout and design ideas were. But I realized that I had done the best I knew how. Then, with a Connection in my lap, it struck me that just as those journalistic skills had developed, so had my feelings about my orientation. I knew that I was no longer ashamed of who I am and was no longer ashamed of enjoying the sex that God gave me.

The only question remaining, I thought, was whether I would ever work for the church. In my heart I knew wanted to serve God through His church, but I wondered if its members € from the same stock as those who rejected me in academy and lied to me in Russia — would have me.

Kinship helped me embrace my orientation. Russia brought me to terms with sex. And now after months of fruitless searching, I am left wondering if I wouldn't find a more logical answer to my final question by going back to where my sexuality was awakened. Maybe I should return to the baseball bleachers and just ask Jeff.
