organization. We minister to the spiritual,
emotional, social, and physical well-being
of current and former Seventh-day
Adventists who are lesbian, gay, bisexual,
transgender, and intersex individuals and
their families and friends.

Kinship facilitates and promotes the understanding and affirmation of LGBTQIA+ Adventists among themselves and within the Seventh-day Adventist community through education, advocacy, and reconciliation. Kinship is a global organization which supports the advance of human rights for all people worldwide.

Founded in 1976, the organization was incorporated in 1981 and is recognized as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization in the United States. There are also regional and population coordinators in specific areas. The current list of members and friends includes more than 5,000 people in over 90 countries.

Kinship believes the Bible does not condemn or even mention homosexuality as a sexual orientation.

Ellen G. White does not parallel any of the Bible texts that are used to condemn homosexuals. Most of the anguish imposed upon God's children who grow up as LGBTQIA+ has its roots in the misunderstanding of what the Bible says.

I love to travel, so almost any place I visit is my favorite place at the time. I love Germany each time I'm there because for me it is like being home. My family there is very important to me. But one of my favorite places is Iceland. I really enjoyed my time there. The balance of fire and ice is fascinating.

Best family memory?

Oh, the innocent memories as a child growing up and going to Keene, Texas, to attend the Texas camp meeting. I thought I was experiencing a taste of heaven.

What do you do as Vice President?

I'm working on projects to better provide support, train, and cushion supporters, and offer community organizing, outreach, and education.

What do you hope to accomplish as Vice President?

I would like to build a process for listening to the needs of people who join us, no matter where in the "Rainbow Alphabet" someone lives, and provide additional ways to support them.

I would like to listen to people who want to contribute to our Kinship community in a variety of ways, learn their strengths, and provide training, support, and skills building. As our members reach out to others in various ways, I plan to offer debriefing and "Share Vision" times. I want our community to nurture our volunteers at whatever level they serve.

Finally, I want to continue to educate the world around us (ecclesiastical or not) about issues that face people who live on the margins and about ways all of us share aspects of our life (like living with grief or recovering from trauma). "Gender for Geezers" is an example of this.

How do you identify? (LGBTQIA+ or ally)

As far as I can tell at the moment, I am a cisgender female who is generally attracted to women. Like many of the young people with whom I work, I like having options. That said, 97 percent of my relationships have been with women.

What do you love about Kinship?

It's a place of sanctuary and a place to learn how to strengthen the skills to be in community. It's a place to give back a tiny bit for the gifts I have been given here.

With families, I learn to work and be with people I might never have known in any other way.

Something no one would ever guess about you?

People who know me well know I am an introvert.

Best family memory?

One Christmas, my single-parent mother managed to take a wooden packing container, cover it in brick-design wrapping paper, make it look like a fireplace, and fill it with packages. To this day, I remember being in awe at what seemed like a magical event.

Something that never fails to make you smile?

Rainbows, cats, dogs, otters, getting on a train, the windmills in the North Sea followed tulip fields as the plane reaches the Netherlands, the night sky, the unexpected amazing photograph.

What do you do as Director of Church Relations?

European Kinship Meeting Report

This year's European Kinship Meeting (EKM) was held about an hour and a half outside of Amsterdam in the Netherlands from September 2 to 6, 2021. EKM was made possible by the leadership and coordination of Ruud Kieboom and the financial support of an anonymous donor.

Cookies, late-night talks, and chosen family: this is what European Kinship Meeting (EKM) meant to me.



As someone who isn't out to most of my family, many of my friends, or at work, it's hard to find space to be my authentic self. So, in the midst of a pandemic, I made the crazy decision to meet my fellow Kinship members in Europe at EKM. As an American, I worried that I was encroaching on their territory, but everyone welcomed me warmly. I felt like I had found another family.

It was cozy. We stayed together at a conference center and shared meals in between meeting times. Our guest speaker introduced us to the idea of "Queering the Bible," and we took another look at several Bible stories. We welcomed the Sabbath with praise and song. We were even blessed to have communion.

We spent a day at nearby Hertogenbosch. Wandering the cobblestone streets, we explored parks and Saint John's Cathedral, tried local desserts, and shopped. It was a beautiful city.

The best part of any Kinship Kampmeeting is the conversations—those soul-sharing, heart-rending stories we told each other, knowing that we were fully understood and loved. It's incredibly freeing to be in such a warm, lovely, safe space.





Connecting & Supporting LGBTQ+ Families

Kinship Families & Friends Zoom Roundtable

The SDA Kinship Families & Friends group desires to support all families working their way through emotional and, possibly, confusing times. We (Carolyn and John) conducted two Sabbath school evaluations. In one class, 42% shared that they had an LGBTQ+ family member, and in the other class, it was 45%. We also estimate that 5-10% don't know if they have an LGBTQ+ family member, while an additional 5-10% don't care to admit it.

We comfortably believe that at least 50% of the families in our congregations have an LGBTQ+ member— maybe a son or daughter, grandson or granddaughter, niece or nephew, brother or sister. It could even be a husband or wife. Varied gender desires and needs are more common than many families realize.

When a family discovers a variation, their feelings and emotions can be confused and unsure. Their actual decisions and responses can also cause unhealthy reactions and feelings throughout the family. There is excellent support information and experiences they can get so that, if a family desires to understand and learn more, they can make the best loving decisions for their family.

One activity is the Kinship Families & Friends Zoom Roundtable discussions that happen on the third Sunday of every month at 9:30 AM Pacific Time (PT). Families and friends from around the world join each session, sharing and connecting with each other. Often the roundtable has a keynote speaker, which allows more specific questions and sharing of helpful, accurate information. The roundtable has helped many families connect with other families and allies, helping them adjust and support their LGBTQ+ family member.

Please visit https://sdakinship.org/en/kinship-famfriends for the directions and link to join the roundtable. You can choose to be visible and share or you can be invisible and instead text your questions for the attendees to respond to. Each session normally lasts 90 minutes.



The UnClobber Project in 2021

UnClobber tells of the personal journey of Pastor Colby Martin as he researches the Bible's six "clobber texts"—the only places in Scripture that might plausibly address sexual orientation—and comes to a new understanding of how the church can relate to members of the LGBTQIA+ community from a biblical and compassionate framework. Pastor Colby isn't the first to learn this, but his story and biblical interpretation communicates the message in a deep, balanced, and accessible way.

In 2021, SDA Kinship sent over 1,000 paperback and ebook copies of *UnClobber* to people around the world. We have collaborated with the publishers to ship *UnClobber* in paperback, not just to the United States, but also to Canada, Europe, Australia, and New Zealand. The ebooks are provided through Amazon Kindle, and we can only send them to the U.S.-based



accounts. We are not able to send books to other locations in South America, Africa, or Asia at this time, but we are looking for other resources that we may be able to share.

As we move into 2022, we look forward to sending out another 1,000 books. We are also looking into accessing the UnClobber online courses to see if that resource can be leveraged to support Kinship members as well.

We will provide the book FREE of charge for current Kinship members, their families, local congregations, and others in the community. Our aim is to educate members and leaders in Adventist communities, promote dialogue within Adventist spaces about LGBTQIA+ issues, and hopefully change some hearts and minds within local churches. We also want members and families who have LGBTQIA+ loved ones to get this book, so that they can learn how to read and interpret the Bible in a more affirming and loving way.

Book Rec #1: Red, White & Royal Blue by Casey McQuiston


Red, White & Royal Blue is one of my all-time favorite books. We join Alex and Henry for an enemies-to-lovers secret tryst, romantic comedy. Meet Alex, the First Son of the United States. He has political dreams of one day serving the people. In the meantime, he'll work on his mother's reelection campaign (yes, the United States has its first female president!). He loves his life, work, and friends—there's just one thing that gets to him: the conceited Prince Henry of England.

Henry, on the other hand, secretly loves dogs and *Star Wars*—oh, and he's gay. This would be a scandal if it ever got out, and he's going to make sure it never does. When push comes to shove (literally), Alex and Henry find themselves in the midst of a public relations nightmare. Desperate to tidy up a disaster, the leaders of both countries make a decision: it's time for Alex and Henry to become best friends, if only to appease the cameras.

What happens next is the beginning of a genuine friendship. Alex can't believe he wants to text the Prince of England silly snippets of his day. It's absolutely nothing more than friendship—and Alex is straight...right?

This book is sweet and funny with a delicious slow burn romance. You'll find yourself smiling along the way. I recommend you grab a blanket and cuddle up with your soon-to-be favorite queer romance.

Book Rec #2: I Wish You All the Best by Mason Deaver

I Wish You All the Best is the first novel I've read featuring a nonbinary character. The author is enby (non-binary or NB) themself, so the book is written with an authentic voice. Ben is a high-school student who's just done a terrifying thing: they came out as nonbinary to their parents. And it didn't go well. Now, Ben finds themself living with an estranged older sister in a new town and going to a new school.

Scared to come out again, Ben goes back in the closet at school. They don't even tell their new friend, Nathan, who does everything he can to get Ben to open up. As Ben navigates their family trauma and starts building a relationship with their sister, they find solace in painting. But what happens when a student art show leads to a confrontation with the parents who rejected them? And what if people find out who Ben really is?

This novel taught me a lot about enby folks. I feel like I better understand their struggle for acceptance and identity. It gave me a lot of practice using they/them pronouns. The author has posted on Instagram several times about getting misgendered even in promoting the book. I Wish You All the Best has a lot to teach each of us—if only we're willing to listen.

For younger audiences

Book Rec #3: Magnus Chase and the Gods of Asgard by Rick Riordan

You can't go wrong with a Rick Riordan book. He's a phenomenal children's author and I highly recommend nearly every book he's ever written. They're that good. His Percy Jackson and the Olympians series is followed by The Heroes of Olympus and The Trials of Apollo, both of which include two gay characters as well as the chaotic bisexual/pansexual god Apollo. Granted, the queer characters are written in later, which is why I'm recommending the Magnus Chase and the Gods of Asgard series here.

Magnus rather reluctantly and unexpectedly finds himself living on after death as one of the god Odin's einherjar (warriors who prepare to fight in the eventual Ragnarök battle). With his new friends—including a Muslim Valkryie, a deaf elf, and a fashionable dwarf—Magnus gets caught up in


the gods' petty conflicts and has to save the day (repeatedly) to prevent major cataclysmic events.

In book 2, *The Hammer of Thor*, we meet Alex, a genderfluid demigod, whose pronouns change daily. Alex is fierce and she/he and Magnus don't get off to a strong start. However, Alex gains the team's respect as a fearless warrior (not that she/he cares).

What I love about Alex is how strong she/he is. Alex has learned to depend only on herself/himself, and joining a team is hard. Magnus is rightfully scared for his life, but they eventually develop a friendship—and maybe more. I also appreciate that Magnus doesn't have a sexual crisis—he's just probably pansexual, no big deal.

This series is excellent for those seeking adventure. You'll learn a lot about Norse mythology and gain a deeper appreciation for the fluidity of gender and sexuality. But in the end, you'll just have a lot of fun too. It's guaranteed to leave you with a smile on your face.

Book Rec #4: Redeeming Love by Francine Rivers

Another one of my favorite books is *Redeeming Love*. This story is based on the biblical prophet Hosea's relationship with his wife, the prostitute God tells him to marry. Based in the 1850s in California, it tells the eventual love story of Michael, a farmer, and Angel, a prostitute with a traumatic past. God tells Michael to marry Angel when he sees her briefly in town.

After rescuing her from a near-fatal beating, Michael takes Angel home to his new farm. Angel decidedly rejects this new husband and his God and yearns to return to the city. Michael offers ceaseless compassion, patience, and love.

Just like the woman in the book of Hosea, Angel leaves Michael time and time again. Each time, God tells Michael to bring her back. Slowly, Angel opens herself up to being loved, not only by

Michael but also by God. But she knows she doesn't deserve it, just like she doesn't deserve her new life.

This book will make you cry, I guarantee it. But it will also leave you feeling hopeful and loved. It showed me the love God really has for me, and it's a book I've needed to read time and again.
