Relationships such as ours were shared only among the closest of friends. Within a matter of a few weeks we felt that we were meant for each other and decided to exchange rings. We chose a simple design in silver that we love to this day. Almost a decade later, during a stay in Amsterdam, we had them copied in gold, but it is the original ones that we continue to wear. They mean a great deal to us, and after all these years they remain the most visible symbol of our love.

After finishing college, we lived with our respective families while completing our graduate degrees. Nevertheless, we managed to spend practically all of our free time together. We often went on weekend "honeymoons" to neighboring states. We felt a touch rebellious for even daring to think in those terms. Canada became one of our favorite destinations for longer trips during vacation breaks. As soon as we were both teaching on a regular basis, we began to spend the summer months in Europe. In retrospect we think that traveling, when possible, is a great way to both test and build a relationship. It certainly brings out the best and the worst in one. Finding solutions to whatever problems may come up is a good way to develop confidence and trust in each other. We feel that the unavoidable sharing involved in the process can provide strength to a partnership.
